Letter from near the Rectory

Dear Neighbours,

Many who are still in 'the world of work' will be driven by Performance Indicators and Key Targets. Even the NHS is now driven by the need to measure itself and record past performance. The trouble is some things cannot be easily measured. How do you measure how many people the NHS has helped or cured? They try to do it by counting the number of patients seen and how long they stay in hospital. This of course is false information. If a patient is sent home too early, it looks good on the statistics but is bad for the patient. It can be the same for the Church. We judge ourselves by how full the Church is (or is not!). What is the purpose of the Church?

By Church I mean the community and not the building. Acts 2:42 describes the early church, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." So the church is to teach the Bible, provide a place of fellowship, share the Lord's supper, and pray. Acts 1:8 reads, "...you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." The church is called to be faithful in sharing the Gospel through word and deed. The church is to be a 'lighthouse' in the community, pointing people towards Christ. Another great purpose of the church is given in James 1:27, "Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress..." The church is to minister to those who are in need. This includes not only sharing the Gospel, but also providing for the needs of the community as necessary and appropriate. Corinthians 12:12-27 reminds us that we are God's "body" – we are His hands, mouth, and feet in this world. We are to do the things that Jesus Christ would do if He were here physically on the earth.

So, what are we actually doing? The Sunday School, now called The Challengers, is sometimes a forgotten asset. In spite of the statement in this magazine it is still assumed by many that the Sunday School is for Over Wallop children. The Challengers is for the Wallops! It is a place where our children can learn in a simpler way than any sermon could provide, free of the ritual and litany of the main services. Anyone, from both villages, will be made very welcome in Challengers or in either Church. For Church these days some wear a jacket and tie while some wear jeans and a jumper.

A recent move in the community has been the growth of the Wallops Fellowship Group. The Fellowship Group was formed out of the Alpha courses held here in the Wallops. They have a desire to meet, chat, discuss the Bible and pray. They are ordinary people, not deep into theology and complicated thoughts. They are searching for answers just like you and I. They get together and discuss things, share their thoughts, their feelings and their doubts, spend some time together in fellowship. As trust build up in the group it is a wonderful place to share worries (and joys) and to offer them in prayer. Anyone is welcome to come along to the Fellowship Group. They are also prepared to do something positive in the community, hence the Coffee Mornings. You will not find Bibles on the tables at the Coffee Mornings, but you will find people who have come along for a chat, to give their time and energy, along with coffee and cake of course! Their Coffee Mornings are social events for the whole community. I have been to a Coffee Morning, it was well attended and everyone enjoyed it.

The Church is more than a place to worship, more than a place for weddings, funerals and other life events. The Church is part of the greater community. The Church is not just the number of people who sit in it on a Sunday. The Church is part of the Wallops and it would be a sad day if the Church faded away and wasn't used. It is our Church and part of our villages. That is the true purpose of the Church, to be a part of the community it serves.

NEW YEAR NEWS FROM THE W.I.

We were delighted to welcome three guests, who may well decide to join the Institute, to our meeting on 11 January. January is a prolific month for W.I. birthdays (including those of our President and Treasurer). Four posies were presented and, considering that it was the bleak mid-winter season, much credit was due to the posy maker (or makers) for producing such charming ones.

Our speaker for the evening, Mr Eddie Pollikett, was due to introduce us to the skills of tracing family history with a talk entitled **Genealogy – How to get started**. Coming from the wilds of Chandlers Ford – where I always get lost – poor Mr Pollikett was almost defeated by the intricacies of Over Wallop and arrived in a state of nervous exhaustion. However, a calming puff on his pipe in the car park restored him sufficiently to begin, and almost bang on time, for which we were most grateful. A fascinating talk then followed.

It is very difficult to produce a summary from the sea of information we were given. Having explained that unusual names, like Pollikett, were easier to trace than Brown or Jones, Mr P. went on to give us a guided tour of those institutions which hold family records and who may be approached for access to their holdings or simply for help. A **Tracing Your Family Tree Fact File** was handed out listing national centres such as The Family Record Centre in Islington or the Public Record Office, now in Kew. At a local level were Parish Registers now to be found in County Record Offices along with Manor Court Rolls and assorted family papers. We must not forget the INTERNET which was becoming a very important tool and could provide an introduction to hitherto unknown family connections world wide.

It was obvious that Mr Pollikett derives enormous satisfaction from his researches and some of his enthusiasm rubbed off on his audience, most of whom spent the remainder of the evening discussing what was known of each other's forebears. Jennifer Stanton and Ruth Cartwright's delicious refreshments contributed to our enjoyment of the evening.

OVER WALLOP PARISH COUNCIL - EXTRACTS FROM JANUARY MEETING

Present: Cllrs. Burden, Cleife, Keightley, Macey, Quick and Taylor-Firth. There was one member of the public present and Mrs Cartwright, Neighbourhood Watch. Apologies: Cllr. Glover.

Minutes: The minutes of the meeting 14 November were signed as a true record. Amendments were made to the numbering and under Public Points from the floor the clerk had typed Wallop Defence Systems when it should have read Army Air Corps.

Urgent Items: Cllr. Keightley advised the council that the Army Air Corps have yet to agree to attend a Parish Council meeting. They had invited the council to attend a briefing session at the camp, but we had declined as it was not a suitable time of the day, also as we want the officers to attend a public meeting so that members of the public could comment. Cllr. Keightley will try to get them to attend the next meeting scheduled for February.

Cllr. Burden advised the clerk that there has been tipping in the watermeadows by the builders on the site of Meadow Cottage. This is a conservation area and the clerk agreed to bring it to the attention of TVBC. It was also noted that the house under construction looks as if it is being built contrary to the agreed plans and the building line seems to have been brought forward. The clerk will bring this to the attention of the building control department at TVBC and ask them to check.

Neighbourhood Watch Update: There were minimal disturbances and only one burglary within Over Wallop during the last 2 months. The main trouble has come from the younger children and the local police have been talking to the schools regarding this. There is also a higher police presence at the moment which seems to deter. Cllr. Keightley urged the councillors to keep talking to the children and encourage friendliness. It goes without saying of course that if anyone sees anything suspicious they are to report it to the police immediately. Mrs Cartwright advised the council that there is still some money for funding from the police and could we look into the possibility of a shelter. All councillors agreed that at the moment all money needs to be ploughed into repairing Evans Close Playground and reminded Mrs Cartwright that the last shelter built only lasted two weeks before it was vandalised.

Planning: Current plans: 05/01111/FULLN Clarendon Court, Station Road, Over Wallop. Erection of single storey extension to northwest elevation to provide an office. No Objection.

Retrospective Plans: 05/00057/REFN Cleitus Cottage, Mount Hermon Road, Palestine. Notification of appeal against decision for refusal of planning permission. All Cllrs agreed that no additional comment was required and that they stood by their earlier decision. It will therefore be decided by TVBC at the appeal.

Precept & Budget: The income and expenditure was explained to all councillors and the budget was agreed for the forthcoming financial year. It was agreed that a precept of £20,150 was needed to fulfil all the requirements with Evans Close and to pay the general bills.

Playground and sports field: Cllr. Macey reported in detail on the situation at Evans Close playground. Quotes have been obtained to repair and make safe the playground. An estimate of approximately £3000 was received from a villager and it was agreed that this quote would be pursued further. It was also agreed that the clerk would chase SEC regarding the new light that has been proposed for Evans Close to light the area better. Cllr. Macey also advised that quotes were needed to fit grilles on the pavilion windows as they have been broken. Cllr. Macey will obtain quotes for this.

Footpaths: The clerk advised that she had requested copies of the map showing bridle paths from TVBC and she will chase give these to the footpaths officer.

Wallops Hall: Cllr. Keightley updated the council on the situation of the hall. He advised that three committees had been set up to handle different aspects of the project, which are fund-raising, renovation and re-build. He also advised that the general consensus of opinion from the public was that the current site be looked into for a joint hall, whether it is a re-build or a complete new build. He advised that the next meeting was scheduled for Monday 23 January.

Public points from floor: It was reported that the sign for Palestine on Mount Carmel road is missing. The clerk will organise a replacement. It was asked if the council would approach Hampshire Highways to widen and strengthen the road on the eastern end of Mount Carmel Road at Blackburn Farm, as lorries are using it and it is not strong enough to cope with the weight and volume of traffic. The clerk will speak to Hampshire Highways regarding this.

Extracts from the January meeting

Attendance: Cllrs. Beeley, Edwards, Rogers, Roach, Souter, Whitaker, Young and eight members of the public.

Apologies: HCC Cllr. Woodhall and TVBC Cllr. Boulton.

Planning: a) 05/01103/LBWN demolition of conservatory, erection of garden room, enlarge lean-to shed, internal alterations and erection of boundary wall;1 Sunnyside Cottages, High Street; no objection.

b) 05/00978/FULLN erection of summer house; The Old Hall, 10 Fifehead Manor, Salisbury Hill; no objection.

c) 06/002/TREEN raise canopy of yew tree and fell conifer; Pinxton House, Heathman Street. Cllr. Whitaker left the meeting declaring an interest. The council voted unanimously for no comment on the planning application.

Points from the floor: treeworks in the field along The Causeway – Mrs Smith was concerned about the timber being brought into the field for cutting and the hedge which had been grubbed out. There is also a new shed. Contact will be made with the owner and a check on planning permission done (**Action: Parish Clerk**). *Mrs Mongor was concerned about the amount of mud on various roads (**Action: Cllr. Beeley**).

Neighbourhood Watch: Cllr. Souter reported on a busy month. There had been a spate of break-ins on seemingly empty houses with jewellery and valuables being taken. There have been several incidents of this kind in both Nether and Over Wallop. He urged parishioners to be aware of strangers in the area and to contact the police if they have concerns. A burning car had been abandoned in the layby at the top of Bent Street. The previous weekend staddlestones had been dumped near Haydown Farm.

Finance: Cllr. Beeley recommended that the precept be kept at the same level as last year.

Highways: Cllr. Beeley reported that there is still some work outstanding to be carried out by Hants Highways. Regarding the difficulty in access along Trout Lane they are having trouble tracing the ownership of the road.

Playing Fields: Cllr. Rogers reported that the tennis and football bookings are going well. Mr Osmond will cut the hedges. Miss Hayward has requested a green bin outside the pavilion (**Action: Parish Clerk**).

New Village Hall Trust: Cllr. Rogers reported that the AGM for the Trust was held last week. An account of the outcome of the previous meeting was printed in the Wallops Parish News. Feedback has been very positive. A small working party will explore the idea of refurbishing the pavilion with the possibility of building an attached hall on the playing fields.

Wallops Parish Hall: Cllr. Rogers reported that there is to be a meeting on Monday 23 January and encouraged all to attend. Various working groups will bring their findings to this meeting.

Village Green: Cllr. Roach reported that the carol service held before Christmas had been a great success with approximately 150 people attending. A collection was taken totalling £301; of this £150 had gone to the church organ fund and £150 to the village green fund. The Christmas tree was donated by Mr D. Greenwood. Cllr. Rogers has been in touch with the solicitors and will liaise with Cllr. Roach on deciding the extent of the car park.

Correspondence: Residents of Aylwards Way are concerned about the trees at the back of Pantiles and are in touch with the letting agents. Cllr. Rogers is in the process of drafting a letter to TVBC and has taken some photos.
