## LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

---

I wonder what your New Year's resolution might be. Taking up a new hobby? Cutting out sugary snacks, putting on the walking boots instead of picking up the car keys? Shopping at the village shop instead of driving into Andover or Stockbridge?

Maybe you would simply like to make a little space for yourself? Once the Christmas decorations come down, we begin to realise just how 'cluttered' Christmas has become. However, it's not just Christmas that is cluttered, but so many other parts of our lives too. How often is the only 'me time' to be found when in the shower – not really a luxury! Even our faith has become cluttered – so many questions, so many ifs and buts that sometimes it's hard to remember what it is we do actually believe in! ## Celebrating our faith at home. Epiphany

Have you ever wondered why we have to take down our Christmas decorations? They bring such joy and light to our homes at the darkest time of the year and it can seem so dreary when they come down. I was brought up to understand that it's bad luck to leave decorations up after 12<sup>th</sup> night – but I don't believe in luck, I believe in Jesus, so let's look once more at his story.

The wise men, kings or magi brought their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, long after the shepherds had visited. In the church we celebrate this at Epiphany (6<sup>th</sup> January). The Bible tells us that in trying to find the baby Jesus they aroused the interest of the angry and dangerous King Herod, who, feeling threatened by Jesus decided that all children under the age of two should be killed. The magi warned Mary and Joseph that they had to leave Bethlehem immediately, so they packed up and left for Egypt, until Herod was dead and Jesus was safe. So we too pack everything away, at least until it is time to celebrate again!

### Celebrating at home

Why not try one of the following?

1. Re-read the Christmas story (in an age appropriate Bible) looking out for the wise men, in Matthew chapter 2 (or online at [www.biblegateway.com](http://www.biblegateway.com) )
2. Keep your nativity set up for an extra day – especially if you have been allowing your wise men to journey slowly to the stable as they have only just arrived.
3. As you tidy away your decorations, think about how Mary and Joseph and the young Jesus (who was probably about 2 years old) were feeling as they packed up all their belongings. If you have had to move house recently maybe you can share your feelings about it with Jesus in prayer?
4. Celebrate with an epiphany cake! Hidden inside an epiphany cake is a bean or nut which symbolises the baby Jesus. Whoever finds the bean in their piece of cake is king for the day (or queen!).

## Season's Greetings

The Royal British Legion celebrated its 90th anniversary during 2011. Throughout the year and across the country, the level of public support for the work that we do and the values that we uphold has been unprecedented and, at times, deeply humbling.

As well as being a time for commemoration, this special anniversary has offered an opportunity for us to reflect on the ever changing needs of our Armed Forces community. In order to resource all of our ever-expanding beneficiary services, the pressure was on to make 2011 a bumper fundraising year. Our tireless teams of supporters, members and volunteers rose to the challenge magnificently by constantly finding new, innovative and engaging ways of persuading the generous British public to support our work. During the summer, Poppy Party celebrations took place across the country, and the target busting 2010 Poppy Appeal raised a record £36.7 million.

2011 has undoubtedly been a very special year for the Legion and we should be rightly proud of all we have achieved by working together in the true spirit of comradeship. But 2012 promises to be an equally busy and challenging year where the interests of our Armed Forces personnel – in active service across the world – remain ever prominent in the public consciousness. ### Warning from Trading Standards - telephone cold calling

---

Rogue Traders are currently telephone cold calling vulnerable residents in the County. The caller is unknown but believed to be male and very threatening. He has told residents that they had subscribed to a telephone monitoring service and had run up bills of between £3,500 - £6,000 and defaulted on the payment. They are then asked for immediate payment over the phone by card. When they question this they have been told that unless they pay up they will be arrested within hours by the Metropolitan Police and transported to the Queens Court in London.

Anyone receiving these calls should hang up and are advised to register with anonymous call barring from their telephone provider or to consider changing their telephone number and keeping their number ex directory.

If anyone has any information about traders who are cold calling or requires any advice on doorstep crime they can contact

## The Way Ahead with Miles for Macmillan

---

Macmillan Cancer Support is inviting you to don your walking boots to explore the local countryside and enjoy fresh air and stunning views. At the same time you will be taking steps to improve the lives of people living with cancer by fundraising to support vital health and information services across the region.

If you enjoy walking at a time, pace or place convenient to your life-style, the charity is urging you to consider registering for the Wayfarer's Walk on its website [www.wayfarerswalk.org.uk](http://www.wayfarerswalk.org.uk).

Macmillan adopted the 70 mile trail -which stretches from Inkpen in Berkshire to Emsworth in Hampshire - as part of last year's centenary celebrations. The project is called The Way Ahead.

There is an online fee of £12.50 but once registered there is unlimited access to a wealth of information about the walk, including a variety of maps and route details,

10 special hidden geocaches and a package of discount vouchers.

If you prefer being part of an organised event there are currently two such walks available in the beautiful Hampshire countryside as part of the charity's national walking programme, Miles for Macmillan. More events are in the pipeline.

On Sunday, February 12<sup>th</sup>, a six mile circular Valentine's Walk will take place in Hambledon, renowned as the 'cradle of English cricket'. And on Sunday, May 6<sup>th</sup>, there are two circular route options, 7 ½ miles or 12 ½ miles, starting at Ecchinswell and encompassing the famous Watership Down.

It is through no fault of their own that these cats are homeless.

We will be holding a collection outside Tesco, River Way, Andover on Friday and Saturday the 27<sup>th</sup>, 28<sup>th</sup> January. We also need good quality books and bric-a-brac for our spell in the Whitchurch Charity shop which begins mid-February.

We took Christopher in from a vet in Winchester at the beginning of July. He had been found straying and taken to the vet. Cats who find themselves in these circumstances are often euthanized if a place cannot be found for them. Christopher is an extremely large, affectionate cat, around five years old, who just loves attention but would be best suited to an adult home. He has been in care far too long and we are desperate to find a home for him.

## NETHER WALLOP PARISH COUNCIL

### Extracts from the December Meeting

---

**Attendance:** Cllrs. Atkins, Carpenter, James, Pettitt and Souter. There were no members of the public.

**Apologies:** HCC Cllr. Gibson, TVBC Cllr. Boulton and Cllr. MacDonald-Smith.

**Co-option of new councillor:** The Chairman proposed Mrs. James to fill the casual vacancy on the council. This was seconded by Cllr. Carpenter with all other councillors in agreement. Mrs. James signed the form of acceptance which was received by the Clerk. A Notification of Financial Interests form would be completed and forwarded to TVBC.

**Planning:** none. Cllr. Mrs James has read the Localism Bill proposals and flagged up the issue of local assets. Any new planning development would have to be approved by the Council. However HCC is planning very little action in rural areas. The Village Design Statement has now been superseded.

**Standing Orders and Financial Procedures:** The Chairman confirmed that these have been reviewed and asked for formal acceptance from the council. This was seconded by Cllr. Atkins and unanimously adopted by all councillors. Copies were circulated to all. The Chairman explained that the council has a Responsible Financial Officer as well as Mr. Shoesmith who does all the bookkeeping.

**Neighbourhood Watch:** Cllr. Pettitt has sent a notice to the parish magazine editor regarding the credit card scam and unwanted cold calling and mail with security advice. Both horse rugs and trailers have been stolen locally. Travellers are around and felt tip signs have been left on gates.

**Finance:** Cllr. Atkins reported that there has been a £900 saving on the budgeted election expenses. He proposed that the council apply for an annual precept from TVBC to remain at the same level as this year at £11,500. This was seconded by Cllr. Souter and unanimously agreed by all councillors.

**Highways:** Cllr. James noted that the grit bin in Hosketts Lane has not yet been moved. He will again contact Hants Highways (Action: Cllr. James). The potholes on the road to Chattis Hill have been filled. Cllr. James asked if parishioners

could alert him to any flood areas in the village and would be grateful if they would contact him on his email address: [nwpc@rossanddebs.co.uk](mailto:nwpc@rossanddebs.co.uk)

**Playing Fields:** Cllr. Carpenter reported that a family has booked the playing fields for a football match.

**Village Green:** Carols on the Green would be held on 23 December. A Christmas tree would be supplied by Mr. Pond.

**Nether Wallop Village Hall Trust:** The recent Bingo evening was very successful and raised over £800 for the Trust. There would be more fundraising events in the New Year.

**Correspondence:** The Chairman reported that there is a tree preservation order at Ambergate Kennels, Hollom Down Road. A statement has been received signed by two parishioners proposing and seconding Mrs. James to fill the casual vacancy as councillor. The Clerk has circulated a list of council meetings for 2012.

**Matters raised by councillors:** Cllr. Souter reported that both he and the Clerk attended the Basingstoke and North Hampshire Foundation Trust meeting held on 30 November. The CEO gave an excellent presentation outlining the benefits of the amalgamation of Basingstoke, Andover and Winchester Trusts. The Clerk has requested a written synopsis for councillors. Cllr. ## FROM THE WALLOPS VILLAGE SHOP

---

Hello Dear Readers. What do you call a mischievous egg? A practical yolker. What do you call an egg that goes on safari? An eggs-plorer! Why couldn't the egg get good reception on her TV? Because the channels were all scrambled! This month I thought I would talk about eggs. Do you know where your eggs come from? Yes, I know – a chicken! But, apart from that, we in the shop know where our eggs come from; from East Park Farm in Over Wallop. Our eggs don't travel miles from the producer to the distributor; then more miles from the distributor to the supermarket. Our eggs come from just down the road, fresh to the shop.

Eggs in a shop or supermarket do not need to be refrigerated because they are kept at a constant temperature. Once you arrive home, you should store the eggs in the refrigerator at a constant temperature of 4°C or below. Temperatures above this may lead bacteria to grow and rapidly multiply. Keep the eggs in the original carton and place them on one of the shelves inside the fridge, where the temperature is cold and consistent. Do not store the eggs inside the fridge door, where warm air enters the fridge each time the door is opened. Eggs may be kept for up to five weeks if stored properly in the refrigerator. Make sure that the eggs are kept in the same position as when they were packaged, with the pointed end facing downwards, as this prevents any damage to the air cell.

Keeping the eggs in their original carton is very important, as the protective cardboard slows down moisture loss and protects the eggs from the absorption of strong odours

and flavours, through their porous shells, from nearby strong-smelling foods. The best before date can also be seen if the eggs are kept in the original packaging. Some people store eggs in a cool larder or room, as many recipes call for eggs to be used at room temperature; however, eggs will deteriorate quicker at a warmer temperature. 24 hours of storage in a cool room is the same as 4 - 5 days in a refrigerator. Eggs stored in a cool room, should really be consumed within two weeks. To warm eggs up to room temperature for certain recipes, either remove the eggs from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before needed or place the eggs in a bowl of very warm water for several minutes. Separated eggs can also be kept in the refrigerator but the egg white and the yolk must be kept separate. Place each part of the egg in a small airtight container with a lid and place in the fridge. A thin layer of milk or water can be poured over the yolk in order to keep its softness. Separated egg yolks can be kept for up to 4 days, whilst egg whites should be used within 2 - 3 days.

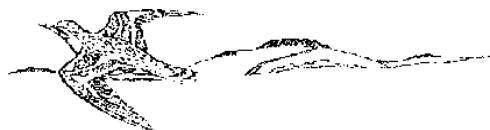

## OVER WALLOP PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Minutes of the held on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> December 2011 in the Wallop Parish Hall at 8pm.

---

Present : Cllr Mrs. L Murray-Twinn – Chairman, Cllr Mr. J Taylor Firth - Vice Chairman, Cllr Mr. T Burden, Cllr Mr. G Cairns, Cllr Mr. M Glover, Richard Waterman - Parish Clerk, Mr. Paul Jackson - Head of Planning TVBC, Members of the Public – 20, Mr P Bye - Grateley Parish Council. Apologies: Cllr Mr. M Hunnibell, Cllr Mr. J Francis, County Councillor Mr. A Gibson, Mrs. R Cartwright and Borough Councillor Mr. T Hope.

**PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY.** The Chairman reported the resignation of Cllr Mr. M Cochrane due to personal reasons. The Clerk will contact Test Valley Borough Council to start the process of advertising the vacancy. Mr. Mark Glover signed the Declaration of Office and was co-opted onto the Parish Council.

**MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING -** The Minutes were altered under the Heading of Parish Council Vacancy – ‘Mr. Mark Glover was approached to join the Parish Council’. The Chairman then signed the minutes of the previous meeting as a true record. Proposed by Cllr Mr. J Taylor Firth and Cllr Mr. T Burden.

**MR. PAUL JACKSON - Head of Planning Test Valley Borough Council.**

Mr. Paul Jackson gave a presentation on the proposed changes to planning and the Localism Bill. Handouts were given to the meeting. Points covered included:

1. The Localism Bill.
2. Basic Principles: Planning at neighbouring level
3. Highlights of the Neighbourhood Planning System
  - Applicants - Parish Councils, Neighbourhood Forums and Community Right to Buy
  - Part of the Development Plan
  - Working within Limits
4. Neighbourhood Development Orders
5. Neighbourhood Planning

Mr. Jackson did not think there would be any radical changes to the current planning system. Test Valley Borough Council's policy has been to protect the rural area from development; it makes much more sense to

keep development close to the town as the supporting infrastructure is in place.

Mr. Jackson answered questions from the Parish Council and members of the public on various issues of planning. The Consultation Document will be in the public domain for discussion and comment in the early New Year.

**URGENT ITEMS** The Chairman reported pot holes in Over Wallop in need of repair. Cllr Mr. T Burden stated that Palestine still has pot holes waiting for repair. A list will be forwarded to Highways and Cllr Mr. A Gibson.

**NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH** Mrs. Ruth Cartwright reported that there have been three thefts, some of metal, from properties in Station Road. There are several telephone and computer scams; residents must take care when receiving telephone and online communications

**FINANCIAL REPORT BANK ACCOUNT BALANCES** Current Account £ 1,425.91; Premier Account £ 8,898.82 = £10,324.73. 106 money applied for £2000; VAT Refund to be claimed £2,166.34

The Clerk voiced concern over the running costs for the playing field which are increasing. The Parish Council needs to look at its sports income as this is not covering the costs, over and above the grass cutting and pavilion running. The Clerk stated that he would produce an up-to-date financial report for the next meeting.

The Chairman stated that a Leisure Committee Meeting needed to be held so that this matter could be discussed with the regular users. A meeting will be organised early in the New Year.

**PLANNING**

11/02609/TPON - Formative pruning works to twelve Yews, crown lift and reduce one Holly and one Yew; brace and crown lift one Holm Oak - The Walled Garden, 3A Appleton Close, Over Wallop. The Parish Council SUPPORTED this Planning Application.

Cllr Mr. M Glover declared an interest in the following Planning application and left the room.

11/02491/AGNN - Demolish dilapidated cow shed and replacement with a slightly larger

agricultural building for storage of farm machinery, re-using existing stored building structures. New building to be 18m long by 8m wide with a single pitch sloping roof 3.66m near road sloping up to 4.8m facing the farmyard. Rebuild and extend dilapidated wall in brick - rebuild to a height of 2m over 3m in length - Blackburn Farm, Wallop Rd, Grateley. The Parish Council SUPPORTED this Planning Application.

**REPORT FROM THE LEISURE COMMITTEE FOOTBALL** - The young football teams are all doing well; indoor training for the winter moved to Test Valley School. The Chairman reported that the Parish Council hoped to get funding again from the Police Authority for the sports programme next year. A grant application will be submitted in the New Year. **PAVILION** - The Chairman is exploring grant funding for the refurbishment of the pavilion to improve the facilities.

**PARISH HALL REPORT.** Cllr Mr. J Taylor Firth reported that no major decisions needed to be made. The Parish Hall has covered its costs this year and made the target set for the increase in bookings. The Chairman thanked Cllr Mr. J Taylor Firth for all the hard work he has put in to the smooth running of the Parish Hall. The Parish Councillors agreed.

**FOOTPATHS REPORT.** Cllr Mr. G Cairns reported that no footpath issues had been brought to his attention. Cllr Mr. M Glover asked for more dog fouling signs to be erected; dog owners bag up their dogs' mess. These bags are then thrown into the hedge which causes an unpleasant problem when hedge cutting. The Clerk will contact the TVBC Dog Warden.

**NEW PARISH- PALESTINE** The Chairman read out the following letter from Mr. G Satchwell in which he informed her and the Chairman of Grateley Parish Council of the intention to seek local support for the formation of a new parish council. This would be within Palestine, with the addition of Locke Close, Campbell Close and the west side of the Wallop Road. The residents involved felt that a new parish council would be more appropriate for their needs.

The Chairman stated that Over Wallop Parish Council would oppose this initiative as Palestine is a ward of OW and has had its own dedicated councillor, Mr. Tony Burden,

for the last twenty one years. The Parish Council is seeking legal advice from Test Valley Borough Council and will meet in the New Year. However, the Parish Council will support a poll providing that it is carried out legally, in compliance with the correct guidelines as laid down by the Electoral Commission.

Residents of the Streetway Road present stated that the correct procedure will be followed. It is planned to poll the area concerned and the results will be taken to Test Valley Borough Council who will if there is a majority consider conducting an official poll.

The wish to form a new parish came as a result of the Streetway Close development and the lack of support residents felt they received from both Parish Councils despite lobbying at Grateley Parish Council Meetings during the consultation procedure.

The Chairman stated that the Over Wallop Parish Council cannot comment on planning applications in neighbouring parishes. Over Wallop does not comment on Grateley nor Nether Wallop Parish Council Planning Applications and vice versa.

**CORRESPONDENCE** The Parish Council has received a letter and Christmas card from Test Valley School thanking them for their continued support.

**MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC** Mr. Peter Benger reported that he had attended several residents' meetings to discuss the proposed new Palestine Parish. He assured the Parish Council that there is no slur on either Parish Council. Palestine has extended somewhat over the years and is now largely a modern development and not ancient settlement. Mr. Benger reported that he had spoken to many residents who voiced their support; the feeling is that Palestine sits naturally between the two parishes of Over Wallop and Grateley. Advice has been taken from Test Valley Borough Council.

Mr. Flippance hoped that the whole ward of Palestine will be polled and that residents would not feel pressured.

**CLOSE OF THE MEETING.**

The Chairman closed the meeting and invited Members of the Public to stay behind for a Christmas drink and a mince pie.

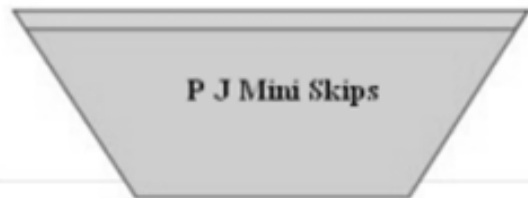
